New Announcements

Zion Mennonite Women are once again doing the MCC School Kit Challenge: Notebooks and pencils are treasures for families around the world who have been forced to flee their homes or struggle to afford basic school supplies. Without these items, many kids in places like Ethiopia, Ukraine and South Sudan can't get the education they desperately need. The School Kit Challenge: 24,000 school kits to help 24,000 kids during the month of August. A list of needed items are: 4 spiral or perforated-page notebooks; about 21.5 cm x 27.5 cm (8.5 in x 11 in); approx. 140 pages (70 sheets) each, totaling 500–600 pages (250-300 sheets); 8 new unsharpened pencils; 1 ruler (flat, good quality; must indicate 30 cm (inch markings optional); 12 colored pencils (in packaging); 1 large eraser; 4 new black or blue ballpoint pens. MW will be collecting donations through August 14. Tax free days are July 30th through August 8th this year.

Pastors, like teachers and parents, are always on the lookout for great ideas. I saw another pastor on Instagram talking about how he had hidden a bunch of little Jesus figures around his church that he had purchased on Amazon. As he described how much fun his congregants had searching for them, I thought to myself, "It's almost Easter. Let's do it!"

The set of 1.5 inch smiling "Tiny Jesus" (as I dubbed them) figures arrived in the mail. I carefully hid them around our church after the Good Friday Service.

The plan was to invite both the young, and young-at-heart, on a fun search through the church building after Easter worship. My hope was that each time folks saw Tiny Jesus' smiling face, it would remind them of God's presence and love - in the large and small moments of their lives.

SLT Minutes

June 17, 2024

Opening: Mike led the opening devotion time on the introduction to the book *Divine Gravity* by Meghan Good. Mike hopes the questions he had after reading the intro will be answered as we continue to read. Meghan Good talks about this being a time like the Reformation. Some areas Mike commented that he would like to hear more about would be why we need a reformation, and how this time period is like a reformation. We discussed some areas in which we'd like to see growth, such as:

- -Desire to look for a deeper, personal relation with Jesus
- -Desire to study more from the Bible; to become familiar with Bible text
- -Finding ways to best serve God in a community that considers itself "Christian"
- -Knowledge in what to do when scripture conflicts with the world

Mike led in prayer to end this discussion. Barb will be in charge of opening in July.

Conversation related to Sue's sabbatical (August 1 - September 30): Mike's term as elder ends August 31, while Sue is still on sabbatical. The PCRC and Gifts discernment have talked to Mike about a one month extension for him until the end of September. This would be helpful for continuity as a new elder comes in, as well. Sue would like to communicate expectations for her ministry going forward. Although she will have completed her seminary work, there will not be a change in her pastoral workload after she returns from sabbatical. She will continue to serve at Zion part time.

Discussion related to processing of memorial donations: Greg had the opportunity to talk to Stewardship about how memorials given to the church are processed. Based on that conversation, the suggestion is to develop a more systematic way of handling these donations. Mike will bring suggestions to the Council for processing memorials, and clearing up current memorial funds to ensure that they are being used, and that donor families are thanked and told where funds have been used, when appropriate.

Helping LAMP (Logistic Assistance for Migrant People): LAMP has talked to Randy Stuckey (Council Chair) and the pastors about the possibility of using the church for their fundraiser. The details of when, and what format the fundraiser might take, have not yet been determined.

Review of past items: The updated elder ministry description has been given to the Gifts Discernment team to be shared with prospective new elders. Sue will give our suggestions for prospective new Congregational Caregivers to the group, to help as they discern and contact people. John David continues to meet with members of the congregation, but has not met with as many in the last month due to summer schedules and his being on vacation. He is considering taking vacation days on July 22-26, but wouldn't be missing any Sundays. John David has an 'emergency sermon' prepared for if he would unexpectedly be unavailable on a Sunday morning.

Pastoral care concerns were discussed.
